

I'm a car guy and veteran Great Plains Street Rodder from Sioux Falls who developed an interest in cars in the early 1960s, and that passion has been with me all these vears. Each month I'll share a picture or two in the newsletter and will offer a short narrative on each for your enjoyment. While I'm primarily a Chevy guy, I'll do my best to mix things up a bit so everyone sees something they might enjoy.

The Flying Dutchman

These two photos show just a couple of the various cars that Al "The Flying Dutchman" Vanderwoude raced over a many- year racing career. Al was one of the more famous racers to ever come from the Sioux Falls area; he grew up in nearby Ellis and attended Cathedral High School. Al left school prior to graduation and went into the Seabees at age 18. By 1958 he was building his own race cars; he started racing Dodges and stayed with Mopars for most of his career. He is credited with having some of the earliest "funny cars" in drag racing. Al's wife, Doris, told me that Al built his own cars and engines, did his own driving, and ran a different car every year. Doris said, "Al was a true drag racer through and through. He believed you had to do it all, and he particularly enjoyed seeing and visiting with kids at the races." Al passed away in 2001. Doris also told me that our own GPSR member, Dick Gaddis, is a cousin of Al's, which I didn't know.

The top B&W was 1965 at the National Drags in Indianapolis. Al is with his altered wheelbase 1964 Plymouth.
