

One of his first major jobs was working for the maintenance department as a mechanic at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. Quite often the value of a job like this is under rated because everything is being taken care of on a daily basis behind the scenes and away from the public eye. Many people do not realize how quickly any business would fail in any aspect if it did not have people like Rick working, keeping it going 24/7. Twelve years into his job at USD, Rick saw an opportunity working with the Department of Transportation and improving his income. Before that could happen, Rick attended Southeast Area VoTec while working full time yet and earned a degree in Applied Science in Civil Engineering. It evolved into planning out and following through with future work done on roads, ditches and bridges that carried him to retirement.

As Rick's decided retirement date neared, both he and his wife, Betsy, thought it would be fun to have a classic car to work on and drive once he got there. Doing this was on their side and two days later a 1955 Chevy was found advertised for sale south of Canton. Rick said as soon as he turned into the long driveway of the farm where the car was located, the '55 Chevy with its new paint job lit up and glowed in the sun. After a short test drive and an agreed upon price, they were taking the '55 home with them.

Rick said they have had the car for about three years now and have enjoyed every minute of both working on the car and driving it. Even the grandkids who lovingly nicknamed the old Chevy "Ruby" can't wait to go for rides whenever they can. Because Rick has always been a mechanic with a make-it-last attitude and wanting to make the car his own, he started in the front installing disc brakes with a matching dual master cylinder. Then he replaced the 327 that came in the car with a new HO 350 crate engine and at the same time installed a new Saginaw 4-speed transmission. After that he freshened up all the rear end innards along with adding 3.08 posi., and finished up underneath with installing new rear springs and shocks all around. He also changed out the wheels the car came with for new old-school Cragar SS chrome 5-spoke mag wheels, as they were the hot wheels to have back in the 60s and still look good today. 



Thotographs and Memories by Tom Olsen

I'm a car guy and veteran Great Plains Street Rodder from Sioux Falls who developed an interest in cars in the early 1960s, and that passion has been with me all these years. Each month I'll share a picture or two in the newsletter and will offer a short narrative on each for your enjoyment. While I'm primarily a Chevy guy, I'll do my best to mix things up a bit so everyone sees something they might enjoy.





That Car Looked Funny

This is Charlie Jacob's 1966 Chevelle, an early version of a "funnycar." You have to study the photos a bit, but if you do, you will note that the rear wheels are several inches (8"-10") forward from where they would normally be, and the front wheels are forward from their original position as well. In the mid 1960s, drag racers in certain classes began altering the wheelbase of the car by moving the wheels forward in order to place more weight over the rear wheels; thus providing more traction. Early on these were referred to as "altered wheelbase" models, later this evolved into the term funnycar." (Story has it that spectators noted the car looked "funny," hence the term "funnycar.")

Charlie was a hardcore Chevy guy and raced a variety of Chevys through the 1960s and well into the '70s. He was always a strong competitor and H & H Chevrolet out of Omaha was his normal sponsor. The car was powered by a big block Chevy with a 4-speed and the latest in go-fast goodies. At the time of the photos, the car was for sale for \$5,000; that would be a nice barn-find today!

Recipe

Holiday Fudge

From the kitchen of Lori Hendricks (Susan's sister)

- 2 packages (8 squares each) Baker's semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 ½ cups chopped walnuts

Microwave chocolate and milk on high for 2-3 minutes. Stir halfway through heating time. Continue to heat until chocolate is almost melted. Take out and stir until chocolate is melted. Then stir in vanilla and walnuts. Spread into a foil-lined 8x8 inch pan. Refrigerate for 2 hours. Cut into squares.


