
One of my favorite things to do when I was a kid riding in a car was standing up on the floor in front of the rear seat to see where we were going. There was usually a rope attached to the back of the front seats in most all 50s cars to hang on to, so it wasn't hard. Keep in mind this was way before seat belts came into the picture, so there were no laws broken then. So with watching where we were going, I loved challenging anyone in the car to see how quick we could guess what kind of car was coming at us in the other lane. Because I was far sighted at a young age, and most cars from the 50s were easily identifiable from a front view, I could guess the car brand way before it got close enough for anyone else to recognize, even my dad.

Archie Dunham was enjoying a warm day driving on the old Brandon road in the summer of 1999 when he spied an old, recognizable Mercury setting way back in a grove of trees as he passed by. Capturing his interest, he slowed down and went back to the farm where the trees and car were to see if he could speak to someone about it. After knocking on the door for a few minutes with no one at



home, he left feeling a little discouraged. The next day Archie climbed into his '56 Ford and went to a car show in Dell Rapids. While he was at the car show, he noticed a woman handing out for-sale flyers as she was walking around. After Archie read the one that was handed to him, he noticed 1956 Mercury and stopped the woman immediately to question her about it. As it turned out, it was the same car in the same location that he had stopped to see about the day before. Not wanting to miss out on a chance to see the car up close, he told the woman he would be over right after the car show. After the show as he drove to the farm, his thoughts were about having a '56 Mercury again as he had when he was a teenager. They were happy times with sweet memories that never went away. After getting to the farm and making their way out to the car, Archie was pleasantly surprised to see the car was in excellent shape and totally complete. The woman told Archie that the car ran but she had lost the title with her move back to South Dakota after her divorce. Archie asked what she knew about the car's history and the story began. She apparently had all the original sales papers on the car that was originally purchased by the Hall Grain Company in 1956 in Acheron, Colorado. It was purchased and used as a salesman's car to sell seed products out of for the Hall Grain Company. The car was driven by a salesman until 1967 then retired by the family rather than trading it off for another car. Now here is the fun part of this story. The Hall family liked the car so much that they stored it inside and used it regularly as a "golf cart" hauling four people around the golf course next door to the grain business with their clubs in the trunk for the next 15 years. Eventually, they stopped using the old Mercury, which was later purchased by the now present owner and her husband living in the same area of Colorado. After a couple years, the present owner and her husband got a divorce, which led her and the Mercury back to South Dakota to be near family. After serving a few months in Ohio, the Johnstons spent the rest of their military time in Florida. The last few months Larry served aboard a carrier ship used for training and qualifying pilots to land and take off from carrier ships.

They both enjoyed their time in Florida. Says Larry, "I've always liked racing. We went to Daytona pretty regular when we lived in Florida and that's probably how I got started. We've done a lot of traveling to dirt-track races. I really like the late-model, big-powered cars."

Street-rodding, too, has always been a big part of their lives. "We used to pull a camper and travel in groups, but it got to be too complicated. Now, that we're older, we stay in motels." Their street-rodding ventures have taken them all over the map including Minneapolis, Kansas City, and Denver to name a few. Says Larry, "Usually, If we want to do something, we just do it."

Dawn adds, "We'd still like to go to Corpus Christi, Texas. The ship that Larry was on has been turned into a museum and I'm kind of a Kennedy assassination "freak" so we'd like to visit Dallas. Then, we'd swing over to Florida to see friends that we still have in Jacksonville and Pensacola."

An only child, Dawn shares that she spent a lot of time with her grandparents. Though her dad "was a wonderful guy," he was also an alcoholic. Her folks divorced when she was 14, but she believes that she still had a good life. 

I'm a car guy and veteran Great Plains Street Rodder from Sioux Falls who developed an interest in cars in the early 1960s, and that passion has been with me all these years. Each month I'll share a picture or two in the newsletter and will offer a short narrative on each for your enjoyment. While I'm primarily a Chevy guy, I'll do my best to mix things up a bit so everyone sees something they might enjoy.



Loves 1965 Chevelles

Parker-area, Sioux Falls and Phoenix resident Don Breen loves 1965 Chevelle 300 Deluxe models! Don owned these two in the 1965-67 time-frame, back when he lived in Sioux Falls. He purchased the maroon car first and raced it for a year of so; shortly after selling that car he bought the white one and raced it for a year. Each car was equipped with the high performance L-79 350hp, 327 ci engine, 4-speed transmission, radio and not much else. The 300 deluxe model was the base model Chevelle offered: the dealer invoice on the maroon car was \$2,869.10 in 1965. The white car ended up in northern Minnesota, the maroon one seems to be lost to the years. Don has had several more of these Chevelles since, which he restores to ultimate perfection and then sells.





A Little History of the Great Plains Street Rodders from Bob Schmeichel


Many of us before the Great Plains car club was ever a thought were Siouxland Street Rodders. It wasn't a very large group at the time, but we did the Easter Car Show in the spring and used the money made from that at the end of summer to rent the fairgrounds and put on the Labor Day Rod Run and Campout. I was playing around then drawing cars then too, that we used on the Labor Day Rod Run t-shirts and dash plaques. For me it was kind of fun to try to come up with some clever designs that depicted camping out with your hot rod.

We were also lucky to have the Argus Leader do quite a few articles on the club and how we thought it was a family hobby even in the early stages of what we were doing. During those early 1970s, we were on the ground looking underneath each others' cars more than today to see how we engineered suspensions and everything else together in that area usually made out of junkyard parts. We took a lot of pride with what we did searching and finding what would work along with doing it as cheap as we could. If you had a couple thousand dollars in the whole build for a street rod that was a lot of money at the time. I had my first drivable rod for \$35 and then put another \$1,200 in it to finish it to my liking. In those days everyone did a lot of bartering to get one thing or another or to have something done. This kind of personal engineering and finishing touches defined who we were at the time as far as building a street rod and having something no one else had.

One evening in 1985, I got a call from Jerry Kennedy, who at the time was a field director for NSRA. He asked my thoughts about having the Mid-America Mini-Nationals in Sioux Falls. He passed through Sioux Falls many times on the way to Minneapolis for the Street Rod Nationals and thought Sioux Falls would be a nice town to do a smaller event for 1948 and older street rods only. So in 1985, I organized a new club for street rods only that eventually was called the Great Plains Street Rodders to help coordinate the '86 National Street Rod Association, Mid-America Nationals that was held in Sioux Falls. The Mid-America Nationals grew and moved. And, so did we by opening up the club to all car enthusiasts.
