
"It seemed like a pretty good car," Gary said.

The fiberglass car was built in Wisconsin in 2001 or 2002. Gary makes no excuses for having bought a car already built. He enjoys driving it, and wouldn't want to wait however long it took to build one himself. He's been having fun with it since he got it and that's what he wanted to do.

It's powered by a Chevy (what else?) 350 c.i. with a single 4 bbl carburetor and a Turbo 400 automatic transmission, leading to a 273 nine-inch Ford (oops) rear end. It also features air conditioning, power brakes and remote activated power windows, so he can turn down the window to get to the door latches that are on the inside only. It also has a stereo CD player.

While the car won second place in Canton this year, as well as additional trophies at other shows, Gary remains modest about it.
