Ot's Pontiac Through And Through

So, when he decided he wanted to build a street rod, he went specifically looking for a Pontiac. He already had a 1967 Pontiac Firebird, so he said when he decided to look for a old coupe, he also decided it was going to have to be another Pontiac.

"I kind of always wanted to do a 30s coupe," he said.

He purchased his 1939 Pontiac business coupe in 1999 in Watertown. It was original, with the straight-six-cylinder engine and three-speed transmission on the column. The body had a little rust, but was pretty straight. It ran well enough that he tried to drive it home after purchasing it, but it quit near Madison. He was able to get it running again, but he had something bigger and better in mind for this coupe.

"I think they look cooler when they're a little bit lower," Ron said of his decision to modify his coupe.

"I tore it apart and subframed it with a Firebird front end," Ron said. "It took me a long time to chop the front

end off of that (original) frame. I was a little worried because I'd never done it before."

He already had a spare 400 c.i. Pontiac engine and a spare 1979 Trans Am rear end, which was part of the reason he decided to look for an old Pontiac that could provide a home for them.

In addition, he installed a Pontiac Turbo 400 transmission and a B&M Hammer shifter. Since the rear end had disc brakes, he installed disc brakes from a Nova on the front. OK, a Nova is not a Pontiac, but it is

from the GM family.


The body is mostly stock, although he did shave off the door handles and removed the bumpers, filling in the bumper holes on the body. He left the sides of the hood off to reveal the big motor. It originally only had one tail-light, but he installed a second one with turn signals. Just this past year he installed smooth running-boards.


It took about three years for him to complete the car. With help from his friend, Kirk

Dues Go Up And Down

The dues for members of the Great Plains Streetrodders went up, but not for everyone.

During a meeting held Jan. 6 a motion was passed to raise the annual dues to \$20 per family. However, as part of an effort to allow husbands and wives to both vote on matters of club business, it was then changed to \$10 per adult individual.

As a result, husbands and wives will pay \$20 and their membership will allow non-adult members of the immediate family to also participate in events. But those who are not married will only have to pay \$10 annually for dues.

Previously dues were \$10 per family or individual, but club funds were not keeping up with costs that included sending flowers to members who had close family members die. That cost has been increasing as the average age of members also increased. In addition, the majority of members expressed interest in paying for a website to be exclusive to the club.

Dues for the active members of the club are payable to the club treasurer at the first meeting after the election of officers. If not paid by the end of February, a notice will be sent. If membership is not paid by April 1, the membership will expire and the member will be dropped from the club roles.

Women Gain the Right to Vote

In a club where past history is often part of what makes members' cars interesting, an important part of our nation's history suddenly repeated itself with the return of an issue that had been decided by our nation over 80 years ago.

In 1920 the United States passed a constitutional amendment and had it ratified by the states to extend the right to vote to women. In 2007 the Great Plains Streetrodders finally followed that example and granted the right to vote to the women in the club.

As various issues came up during a meeting held Jan. 6, 2007 in conjunction with the club's Christmas party, women in the club grew restless about wanting to vote separate from their husbands. Voting had to be done by the husband OR wife, but could not be done by both.

President Kevin Kappenman tried to put that issue off to another meeting so concentration could be placed on other pressing issues, but many of the women wouldn't settle for that.

The policy up until then was that a membership in the club included an entire family and each family was granted one vote on business matters. But as business was discussed at the Jan. 6 meeting, some of the women challenged their husbands for the family's vote on the issue. In some instances, a woman voted against an issue her husband voted for, insisting that her vote canceled her husband's vote because there was only one vote allowed between them and hers was the latest vote.

A motion was made by Cathy Walker that membership be separated between husbands and wives so that each could be considered a voting member. It was seconded by a male club member who shall remain anonymous for his own safety and the motion passed. That means dues will be \$10 per person or \$20 per couple instead of \$20 per family, and each adult member has the right to vote on business.
