The Millers '59 Chevrolet Biscayne

This 1959 Chevrolet Biscayne two-door sedan is another Roy Dyce "rescue," originally built by Roy's son, Jeff. The first time I saw the car at one of the Easter car shows, I loved it. Sedan car (I like posts), BLACK (and straight), big block (no other sound like 'em) -- what else is there?

Sheila and I decided we wanted a street rod approximately four years ago and this car was for sale. I watched it in and out of a local auto sales publication for about 9 months. The night of the first Sioux Falls Automania, we purchased it. It wasn't there, but we went and picked it up before the show on that Wednesday evening.

It was equipped with a 396 big block, sucking Dino' extract through a Holley double pumper and Edelbrock manifold, putting it to a 350 turbo trans, 9-inch Ford rear, with GM disc brakes up front, and Hooker Super Comp "stereo."

Since we acquired the rig, we've added a full set of front and rear seat belt/shoulder harnesses for safety. We wear our belts religiously. The bumpers came off and received a new bling job, f o 1 lowed by change to the rear end. The old junk yard parts came out and got replaced with a new Strange Pro "S" center, outfitted with 3:75 gears, Detroit Tru SCHMECHEL 2008

Trac posi, Daytona pinion support, Moser 31 spline axles followed by a new Moser 9-inch housing, fitted with a set of Wilwood 12.125-inch disc brakes out back and now Wilwood "11" discs up front. The suspension has been beefed up with the rear control arms boxed for strength and new polygraphite suspension bushings for the front and rear.

Driveline Specialists built a complete new rear drive shaft. Then came a front sway bar from Hotchkis Performance.

If anyone wants to make one of these big old rollers handle nice, go the Hotchkis route, the only one that fits the 605 steering box conversion.

I've added the Auto Meter gauges and had the heater core/valve assembly completely rebuilt. If anyone needs information on a guy in California that rebuilds that era control valve, I've got the information.

I've avoided destroying the dash, as the looks are classic, as are the rear tail light/wing configuration.

I have to give special thanks to my high school buddy, Bob Schmeichel, for the "sand and shine" help last year as well as other valued assistance.

Oh yeah, I can't forget the great help from "Big Brother" Bruce. He came all the way home from New York City to help me sort out the wiring the first year. It was a mess. He's a wizard when it comes to wiring a hot rod. The addition of an Ididit tilt steering column corrected the final turn signal malfunctions.

We really enjoy the car. Sheila has an '89 Camaro convertible, but she prefers to drive this one -- mostly because it's an auto, while the Camaro's a 5-speed.

The greatest thing about the car has been the really great new people (friends) we've met in the car clubs and local runs. What great hospitality we've experienced from area rodders in South Dakota, Iowa and Minnesota. You folks are great! I wish that more of the younger crowd would join us and experience the "car-mor-rod-ery".

Pierce Arrow. He purchased this auto in Palm Springs and it was in mint original condition, except for being repainted in the 60's. Only a very small number of these remarkable cars were hand made in Buffalo NY. Some of the features were an

The engine was a 6-cylinder, 825-cubic-inch motor — reportedly the largest production auto motor ever made. It had a 22-quart aluminum oil pan and a 36-gallon gas tank. This car was also in mint condition and had been purchased by a husband and wife who drove this car as their only driver until 1964. It was fun seeing several rare autos in original condition.

What Os A Poker Run? By Clay Seachris

A good cruise for you and your hotrod is to join in on a local "poker run." Poker runs can be a lot of fun, and most are held for some charity or cause.

Entry amounts are low as \$1 per hand. They are great fund raisers, but many times all the proceeds go back to the participants. It is not a race, but instead a fun game of chance and a nice few hours for cruising with stops for socializing and meeting other car enthusiasts. Poker runs have existed for years. These rallies are well known in the car, bike and boat world.

Just what is a poker run? These events consist of all kinds of cruisers and hotrods who all begin at a certain point. There is a list of check points along the predetermined route, at which the participants stop. Normally there are five stops to equal the hands of a poker card game. There may be up to seven stops with discards, so you have the choice of five cards making up a hand of poker. The participant draws a card from a normal deck of playing cards and the volunteer attendant at that stop writes down your card and participant number.

The "rally" is not timed, therefore, the driver and passengers can take their time to visit along the way, see the sites and enjoy the ride. It is best for a driver to have at least one "co-pilot or navigator" to direct them to the next stop. Usually local car club poker runs begin in the afternoon or following a car show or "show-n-shine."

The completion time is set so the final destination is usually at an eating establishment. In the evening at the final destination, everyone gets together to check their "hands." The best five out of seven or the fivecard poker hand that the car participants drew is recorded as that car's hand. Just like in poker, the best hand wins.

There are many variations, with prizes, buying additional cards, drawing envelopes instead of cards, giving clues instead of exact stop locations, etc.
